Background:

Please find attached Policy F/I/3 - Vocational Education. Upon review, it is suggested that this policy be rescinded as it provides no guidance beyond that which is provided or required by the Guide to Education, the Off-Campus Education handbook, and current practice for all courses and pathways offered at the high school level.

Recommendation:

That the Committee of the Whole review Policy F/I/3 - Vocational Education and advise Senior Administration accordingly.



F/I/3 – Vocational Education



EFFECTIVE: June 15, 1988 REVISED: April 15, 2009

REVIEW: 2014-15

1.0 POLICY

1.1 The Board offers vocational education to assist students to integrate educational skills and job entry skill development in a technical learning environment, and to prepare them for employment or further training and education.

2.0 GUIDELINES

- 2.1 Policies and Guidelines concerning vocational education shall be in keeping with the intent of the policies, guidelines and procedures of Alberta Education.
- 2.2 The Vocational Education program may include Career and Technology Studies, Green Certificate Program, Knowledge and Employability, Off-campus Education, or Apprenticeship Articulation courses as outlined in the Alberta ECS to Grade 12 Guide to Education.
- 2.3 The full sequence of vocational courses may be offered if there are sufficient student registrations and appropriate staff and facilities are available. However, no assurance is given by the school that a student who registers in an introductory level vocational course will be able to complete the full sequence unless there are sufficient student registrations to warrant the offering of courses at each level. Students shall be advised of this possibility at the time of registration in the introductory vocational courses.
- 2.4 The principal shall establish criteria to be used in the event of over-subscription to a vocational course.





On behalf of the ASBA Board of Directors, school boards' input on the ASBA Advocacy Plan, Strategic Plan 2015-18 and ASBA Budget 2015-2016 is being sought.

Included in the current strategic plan is the following:

Strategic priority C: ASBA provides leadership in advocating on behalf of school boards and supports boards in building their capacity to communicate and advocate effectively.

Key result C1: ASBA works with school boards to develop shared advocacy positions on key issues to create a stronger provincial voice.

Strategy C1.3: Develop a maximum of three advocacy priorities for the Association.

In September 2014, the Board of Directors determined that as part of the strategic plan survey, school boards would be invited to identify advocacy priorities which will inform development of the ASBA Advocacy Plan.

The ASBA strategic plan is a three-year rolling plan. Annually, the Board of Directors reviews and renews the plan in January, when determination is made as to whether priorities are still applicable and should be included in the next plan, or are complete, resulting in their exclusion from the next plan. Any new initiatives are added at this time. The plan is then implemented beginning that September.

Recognizing the Association has finite resources, both financial and human, and implementation of strategic initiatives requires these resources, the Board of Directors considers the budgetary impact of initiatives identified in the strategic plan when developing the Association's budget.

The ASBA Budget 2015-2016 will be developed by the Board of Directors in Spring 2015, presented at each zone, and voted on by the membership at the 2015 Spring General Meeting.

The ASBA Strategic Plan 2015-2018 will be developed by the Board of Directors in January 2015, approved at the March 2015 Board of Directors meeting, and begin implementation in September 2015.

An integral part of the budget and strategic plan development processes is gathering school boards' input. In response to the Board of Directors' commitment to gathering enhanced data on the views of member boards on the Association's strategic plan, a brief survey based on the current strategic plan's priorities can be found at the following link: https://www.surveymonkey.com/s/ASBA Advocacy Plan and Strategic Plan Survey

Class Size Information

Background:

Annually, Alberta Education requires school jurisdictions to provide a report with respect to the average class size in our schools. This is done using templates provided by Alberta Education and in accordance with the definitions and directions also provided by AE.

- The first page of this report provides the average class size by grade for CORE subjects for each school as well as a jurisdictional average. Please note that core classes include Math, Language Arts, Sciences, Social Studies and Special Education.
- The second page of the report provides the average class size when one includes **ALL** subjects.
- These pages must be posted on our website and are included in next year's AERR.
- The third and fourth pages of the report provide more detailed information about the Division including range, distribution by percentage, distribution by number and average by subject category for CORE and ALL subjects.

Definitions / Directions

- A class is defined as a group of students with ONE teacher for 50% or more of the instructional time devoted to a particular subject.
 - o 50 students in the gym with two teachers for physical education is defined as two classes
 - A learning support facilitator (teacher) who goes into a class of twenty students for two or three periods of LA in a week does not impact the class size. CS = 20:1
 - O A learning support facilitator goes into the same class for 4 of 7 math classes while the regular teacher remains in the room, by definition, provides over 50% of instructional time, impacts class size and is counted as a second class. CS = 10:1
 - o A classroom with multiple grades with one teacher is counted as one class



- Multi-graded classrooms which cross the respective categories are included in the higher grade level. i.e. grade ¾ would be included in the 4-6 category. Lifeskills classes which include students from grades 4,5,6,7,8 and 9 are included in the junior high category.
- Only first semester courses are included in this report
- Special Education classes are included as CORE subjects
- Irregular classes such as work experience, distance learning, are not included
- Outreach programs, Hutterite Colony schools and Oak Hill are not included in the report
- Data reported in this survey is as of October 1, 2014.

Notes

- The rate at which staffing is allocated to schools for the 2014/15 school year decreased at the primary, elementary and junior high level as compared to the previous year. Staffing for regular program is provided to schools to achieve the following class sizes:
 - o Primary (18.75) **19.25:1**
 - o Elementary (25) 25.75:1
 - o Junior High (27) **27.75:1**
 - o Senior High -(26) **26:1**

The 2013/14 rates are included in brackets for reference purposes.

• The average class sizes at the elementary, junior high, and senior high level are significantly below the 'Sturgeon target' due to the impact of 'inclusion' funding.
