



Parent Engagement Early Analysis Spring 2024

Parent Survey

370 parents participated from 17 school sites providing over 5,000 data points of feedback. Again, the survey was designed around the assurance outcomes (Student Growth and Achievement, Teaching and Leading, Learning Support and Governance and Local Context). Areas of strength and areas for focus are highlighted preceding each visual representation of the questions.

Qualitative Responses Parent Survey:

When asked the question, "What else should we know?" The Division received 150 responses. The most common theme was words of encouragement or thanks towards staff and leadership. In terms of areas of focus, safe and caring learning environments were a central concern (19 comments/13%). These comments primarily surrounded the way students treat one another and the way schools respond to disrespectful behaviour. A number of issues specific to individual schools were included in the feedback (17 comments / 11%).

Concerns related to curriculum and instruction (14 comments/ 9%) included thoughts around increasing focus on academic rigor (literacy and numeracy), as well as concerns related to the demands of new curriculum and advocacy for appropriate course selection and guidance. Feedback related to learning supports and specialized programming (14 comments/ 9%) included themes of increased support for complex classroom learning needs and Educational Assistants.

When asked the question, "If I could send a message to Sturgeon Staff, it would be:" the Division received 151 responses. The key themes were positive messages of thanks and appreciation (88 responses /58%). 20 respondents commented around safe and caring learning environments (13%) with a strong emphasis on student behaviour and appropriate consequences at school. Comments focusing on curriculum and instruction (17 comments / 11%) encouraged schools to focus on high quality academics with consistent expectations for assessments.

"As a parent I value their hard work and my kids appreciate how they always put their best foot forward to create exciting learning opportunities. We are lucky to have them! Our administrative staff are the glue that keep our school together. Their knowledge of students, families, grades is exceptional - we are very lucky to have them!"

Parent Engagement Events

This year the Division conducted 6 parent engagement events with more than **195** participants and collected over 1,000 insights directly from parents. Insights from the events can be categorized into the following key themes:

Caring staff in Connected Rural Communities: Parents celebrated and acknowledged the care and attention of dedicated staff members in the context of connected, smaller school communities. A strong sense of community and belonging were evident throughout the comments

Engaging Learning Choices: Parents were very supportive of the wide variety of exceptional programming offered throughout the Division. Outdoor learning, STEAM education, Nutrition Programs, CTF and Option course offerings and extracurricular clubs, teams and activities were greatly appreciated.

Enhanced Communication: Parents recognized and celebrated the division's focus on improving communication at the school and division levels.

Several parents commented on improved transportation which demonstrates marked growth from previous survey data.

What values are important to your school community?

Parents shared the importance of respect, community, inclusivity, trust and accountability, open and timely communication paired with accountability at school was important. When considering what impacted students' ability to display good citizenship, parents indicated media, technology, not feeling heard, low trust, and social or home influences were strong factors.

When asked what the division should prioritize in the 2024/2025 school year, parents reported insights around several key themes:

- Prioritizing academic excellence
- Encourage engaging career paths
- Engaging learning. More time outdoors and less unstructured screen time
- Control classroom size and continue student supports
- Effective, consistent communication from the school level
- Demonstrate care for students and support diversity and inclusion

Future Engagements

Emerging from the parent engagement evenings, was a desire to gain further understanding. As themes of inclusion were included in all engagement sessions, the Division will be hosting a follow-up parent engagement specifically inviting parents of students with diverse learning needs. The Division will also host an Indigenous parent engagement event. These follow-up engagements will allow the Division to capture a more fulsome understanding of parent perspectives and insights.
